N?da Yoga approaches sound as both an external vibration and an internal pathway of consciousness.

The audible voice is one layer of a wider field that includes:

23.1 The thirteen-function ladder

The complete system follows:

$$2+1+2+3+2+1+2=13$$

Its functional arrangement is:

23.2 Pair–center–pair architecture

23.5 Fibonacci roles within the system

One

Represents singular generation or integration.

- Mind Resonator
- Womb or Lower Generative Resonator

Two

Represents coupling, polarity, and paired operation.

- Crown + Third Eye
- Throat Chakra + Throat Resonator
- Solar Plexus + Sacral
- Gut + Root

Three

Represents mediated relationship and stable integration.

- Heart + Soul + Void

Five

Represents a complete harmonic wing.

$$2+1+2=5$$

Eight

Represents one harmonic wing integrated with the central triad.

$$5+3=8$$

Thirteen

Represents the complete upper, central, and lower anatomy.

$$5+3+5=13$$

23.6 Spiral geometry

A golden spiral can be represented as:

$$r(\theta) = r_0 \theta^{2\pi} \phi$$

where:

- (r_0) is the starting radius;
- (θ) is rotational phase;
- (ϕ) is the golden ratio.

For a contracting or returning spiral:

$$r(\theta) = r_0 \theta^{-2\pi} \phi$$

The expanding form can represent:

Its transformation through region (i) can be written:

where (C_i) represents the coupling behavior of that node or resonator.

Each region may alter:

- amplitude;
- phase;
- harmonic spectrum;
- direction;
- informational character;
- relationship to the whole system.

23.10 Path-order dependence

Waveflow is order-dependent.

Void?Throat

does not perform the same function as:

Throat?Void

The first establishes zero before expression.

The second resolves vibration after expression.

Likewise:

Mind?Heart?Gut

is different from:

Gut?Heart?Mind

The first embodies an intention.

The second brings embodied knowledge into conscious interpretation.

Formally:

O_A O_B ? O_B O_A

The order, direction, and phase of the pathway help determine the final state.

23.11 Fibonacci timing

Breath and vocal sequences can also follow recursive timing structures.

A short cycle might use:

1:2:3:5

for:

- silence;
- inhalation;
- onset;
- sustained tone.

A longer cycle might use:

3:5:8

for:

- inhalation;
- vocalization;
- post-tone integration.

The durations may be scaled to the person's natural respiratory capacity while preserving the proportional relationship.

24. Canonical Model Summary

Harmonic Anatomy is organized by the following principles:

- The body contains energetic nodes, harmonic resonators, source-points, and extended fields.
- Chakras primarily receive, transmit, couple, transform, and route energy.
